Some of us were from Kiryat Bialik, Israel Others, like me, were from Boca We were all Jewish teenagers Sharing the same Jewish roots Meeting, enjoying, learning about And learning to understand Each other

As Jews And as teens We had many questions

What is tradition, what is our connection? Issues that underlie the survival of the nation Asked by its conduit to the future By the next generation

The most vital question
That in essence, includes them all
Arose and stood there
Waiting impatiently, desperate to be answered correctly
Since if the answer was unsatisfactory
Judaism's survival would be in jeopardy

Some of us attempted to offer the answer Some answers contained truth But seemed somehow lacking I knew the true answer must be found So I will begin presenting, Attacking, Analyzing and weeding through Hoping to arrive at the truth To the question that affects every Jew

So now I will share the question Whose answer may lead to our strength or to our fall: Nowadays, why do we connect with Judaism at all?

Then a new definition of this rope must be found

For if Jewish parents are the only reason Then what is the reason for a convert - How about the very first Jew -To be Jewish?
